### Principal's Report

#### Assessments and Feedback

We are moving to the end of semester 1 and students in Years 7,8,9,11 and 12 have competed mid-course assessments and received feedback on their performance. Year 10 will begin their assessment period in week 9. The senior executive have been working with students and parents on a structured preparation period for formal assessments and emphasising the values of reflecting on that preparation, understanding some points from feedback and looking forward to improvement from these points. Current research shows that this focus on formative assessment has greater long-term benefit for learners.

NESA is emphasising a movement away from excessive formalised testing and in our implementation of their recommendations, many subject areas have adapted their style and timing of tasks across the course. After feedback, staff will be working on the reporting cycle for all years and reports will be issued for all but Year 10 students by the end of term. With changes to NESA guidelines on assessment and reporting, our Year 11 report format will change to reflect a course mark and an assessment rank for all courses.

### **ROSA Assemblies**

Staff are also finalising their nominations for Recognition of School Achievement Awards for 2018. At our ROSA assemblies on Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> July at 11am and 1:30pm, we will present students with ROSA Awards, Learning Achievement Awards, Learning Honours Awards or Principal's Meritorious Awards. Those students who are receiving an award will be expected to be in full school uniform for their presentation and invitations for award winners and families will be emailed home in week 9.

### Star Struck

Merewether High School is always well represented at Star Struck which occurs in week 7 from 12<sup>th</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup> June. Congratulations to our singers, dancers, instrumentalists, soloists and back-up singers who will be involved and to the devoted parents and staff who support them. The number of students representing us at Star Struck grows each year and we are very proud of their efforts and commitment.



### Academic Reviews

Over the past three weeks Ms Corney, Ms Burnett and myself have interviewed all Year 12 students to discuss their current academic achievements and aspirations. We have been very impressed with all Year 12 students, their honesty and willingness to discuss their current position and the areas they need to concentrate on over the rest of their time with us to maximise their outcomes. We are continually looking at the ways we can support our senior students as they move towards the HSC. Many students from Yr 11 and 12 are using the Independent Learning Centre which is open prior to school (7.30 - 8.50 am) Monday to Friday and after school (until 5.00pm) Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday for private study. The Year 12 tutorials in English and Mathematics are scheduled to build skills prior to the trial and I will present some Chemistry tutorials in the next 6 weeks to assist in this area. **Congratulations** 

Among the achievements of our students most recently, I would like to acknowledge the efforts of;

- Our Duke of Edinburgh award recipients completing Bronze and Silver Awards across semester 1.
- A large team of students attending zone cross-country and athletics in week 5 and 6 with many moving on through to state level of representation.
- The tremendous efforts of our team at NSW. All Schools Swimming who competed in individual and relay events. We had 4 individual medallists in their age groups. These were Ava Jankovic, Kelsey Van Eldik, Charlie Walker and Charlie Hawke. I must also recognise Charlie Walker and Charlie Hawke who have qualified to represent NSW at the School Sport Australia National Championships in Tasmania in July.
- Our School Captains Todd Hodgson and Sophie Griffiths who represented us at both Parliament House and Government House in a recent leadership initiative. Both Todd and Sophie spoke with parliamentarians and visited the Governor and Mrs Hurley at their residence. They are fine examples of our students as a whole and embody our school values of Integrity, Excellence and Diversity.





### **Deputy Principal's Report**

This term has been punctuated by an array of assessments, exams and sporting events. In addition, the creative talents of our students have been highlighted at our annual Moofest film festival, Merewether Portrait prize and with drama, dance, choral and instrumental groups performing as part of Star Struck. The ability of our students to engage in their everyday learning and a range of sporting, cultural and creative endeavours is testament to the determination and diverse range of talents of our students. Merewether High really is a wonderful place to be a student!

Over the course of this term, Mr Southward, Ms Burnett and myself have spoken at Parent Learning Group meetings, with student groups and individual students about developing and harnessing Growth Mindsets. We have encouraged students to focus on setting clear goals to drive their learning so that they are continuously developing their skills and knowledge. As Term 2 draws to an end, students have completed the majority of their Semester 1 assessments and examinations and are receiving results and feedback that is designed to help them move forward in their learning. While there is a tendency to focus on the mark, it is more important that students reflect on their achievements, identify what they did well in each task and articulate what they can now do to further develop their skills and knowledge. This structured reflection will help students develop as learners and support them to understand the power of what they are still able to achieve.

Recently I attended the MHS Duke of Edinburgh presentation awards for students who completed their Silver or Bronze award last year. The Duke of Edinburgh program is coordinated by an incredibly hard working parent volunteer group that strategically plan, guide and support each student to achieve their awards. To achieve these awards students need to set individual goals that focus on self-improvement. Through engaging in the program students develop skills that they will take with them beyond the school environment and I congratulate each of them on this fantastic achievement.

NAIDOC Week 2018 will be held nationally from Sunday 8 July and continue through to Sunday 15 July. Whilst NAIDOC week falls in our school holidays, we will celebrate NAIDOC week with a special assembly and a series of cultural activities for our students in week 9. This year the theme of NAIDOC week *is Because of Her, We Can!* Our student led Aboriginal Education Team and Ms Clarke have been working tirelessly together to coordinate the assembly and plan a range of cultural activities for Year 7 and 8 students.

On Monday week 10 (2<sup>nd</sup> July) we will also have our ROSA assemblies. At these assemblies, students will be presented with ROSA, Learning Achievement, Learning Honours and Principal Meritorious Awards. The Year 7,9 & 11 assembly will commence at 11am and the Year 8, 10 & 12 assembly begins at 1.30pm. Invitations for this assembly will be sent home in the coming weeks. Year 7 – 9 Semester 1 reports will be sent home with students on the last day of term and Year 10 students will receive their reports Week 3 next term. Our parent teacher interviews will take place as outlined below;

- 31<sup>st</sup> July Years 7 & 9
- 9<sup>th</sup> August Years 8 & 10.

Our Year 12 students are over half way through their HSC courses. Recently Mr Southward, Ms Burnett and myself met with each year 12 student for an Academic Review meeting. These meetings have provided us with an opportunity to reconnect with each student, review their progress after the Mid Course Examinations and to work collaboratively to develop specific strategies they can adopt to support their final preparations as they move towards their Trial and HSC Examinations.

HSC English and Mathematics revision workshops will be running from now until the HSC Trial Examinations. These sessions run in the ILC on a Wednesday morning. We encourage students to attend these workshops as a way to consolidate and revise their knowledge and understanding of each course. The program for these revision tutorials is below.



### Model United Nations Assembly

We represented MHS at the MUNA regional competition in Muswellbrook over the weekend 25-26 May 2018. This an annual event that is part of an International Rotary project to educate senior high school students on the United Nations organisation and its commitment to world peace, and international conflict resolution.

Our weekend of debating started on Friday afternoon, when we, along with Mrs Burnett who was our team counsellor, drove to Muswellbrook. After dropping our bags off at the motel and meeting some amazing people from all different schools across the region, we made our way to the RSL club for a wonderful dinner hosted by the Rotary Club of Muswellbrook. Here we heard speeches from each of the participating teams to introduce their country. We also shared many laughs and formed lasting friendships.

We also heard a fantastic speech from Major Thomas of the American Army. Major Thomas talked about leadership, being a leader in the US army for many years himself, and we thought we'd share some of this valuable advice with you. He said that the three main traits that make a good leader are intellect, character and purpose.

The way Model UN works, is that each team is presented with the name of a nation a few weeks prior to the competition and a list of 16 resolutions that are currently, or have recently been debated within the UN. We were allocated Cuba. We debated on several different resolutions using the principles of the UN charter and we adopted the stance of Cuba when forming arguments. Cuba is a one-party communist state ruled by a dictator which was definitely a challenge to work with when we were presented with resolutions based on human rights issues in the world, such as freedom of the press and freedom of religion. Cuban law restricts these so we had to debate why these human rights are unnecessary, which was very interesting.

On the day debate matter ranged from the state of the Rohingya Muslim crisis in Myanmar to reserving a year to celebrate camels and their contribution to many nations. There was also debate on the elimination of nuclear weapons, the conflict between Israel/Palestine and other contentious international issues.

After a long day of lots of debating and plenty of delicious food, we waited anxiously for the results. MHS came in second place overall in the debate out of all the teams from all across the Hunter Region, Port Stephens and Muswellbrook, which was super exciting for us! And although only first place make it through to the national round at Canberra, we were extremely proud of our achievements of the day and would definitely do it all over again.

Overall this was a truly amazing experience where we got to meet so many incredible students and make so many unforgettable memories as well as learning about current international issues and gaining public speaking skills! Most importantly it was super fun! We want to thank the Rotary Club of Muswellbrook for hosting the competition and making us feel so welcome, as well as the Rotary Club of Waratah for sponsoring our team and helping us make the most of this opportunity.

We'd also like to thank Lucy Witherdin who lent her expertise to us in prep for the competition which proved to be extremely helpful, and most importantly we would like to thank Mrs Burnett, for giving us this opportunity, for helping us along the way, for taking us to Muswellbrook and doing all this despite being very busy. 








### CAPA Maya's Moran Prize Excellence

### Playerlink – SSO

On Friday 13<sup>th</sup> to Sunday 15<sup>Th</sup> of April this year I participated in Playerlink, a program run by the Sydney Symphony Orchestra for school students around the state. The program is designed to provide regional students outside of Sydney the opportunity to play challenging music in a full orchestral setting and have the experience of working with and being mentored by professional musicians. The program is held in a different regional area each year - this year it was held on the Central Coast, and I and a number of other Newcastle music students travelled down to participate in the program. I was accepted into the program on oboe, and got to act as principal (1<sup>st</sup>) oboist, playing repertoire including Mussorgsky's Night on Bald Mountain, Beethoven's 1<sup>st</sup> Symphony, Sibelius' Finlandia and parts of the Harry Potter soundtrack, and more. The oboe mentor this year was David Papp, 2<sup>nd</sup> oboist of the SSO, and he provided me and the other oboists with some very valuable expertise and experience to help improve our playing, individually and as a section. The SSO mentors combined also put on a Q&A session for us, where we were able to ask them questions



about practice techniques, life as a professional musician, audition processes and more, which was very beneficial, especially to me as someone looking to go into music as a career. It was also good to see where the members of the orchestra themselves had come from, as many were from regional areas (including Newcastle and Lake Macquarie), showing us that just because we may not have access to the opportunities and teachers available in Sydney doesn't mean we can't become good musicians. After a combined two days of rehearsals the program concluded with a concert for family and friends to attend.

I think Playerlink is an amazing program that is very beneficial for young musicians, and I would recommend it to anyone interested in orchestral playing.



#### Year 12 Student Reminders

UAC Applications: Year 12 are encouraged to start visiting the UAC website and familiarise themselves with the content as it has recently been upgraded. On this site they can find course information, application process information and dates, alternative entry program information and much more about tertiary study.

Accommodation at University: It is time to start looking at and applying for accommodation at university. Many universities are starting to open their accommodation applications and some will fill very quickly on a first in, best dressed basis. Do not wait to be accepted into a course or you will miss out.

Scholarships: A range of links and application advice was delivered to students during Year 12 careers lessons at the end of 2017. These links can be found in the weekly newsletter that is emailed to all students along with the year 12 booklet found in the MHS moodle – Careers – Year 12 Lessons - in the lesson booklet. Parents wishing to also access this information can encourage their child to forward them a copy of the newsletter also. During lessons students were advised to filter through scholarships and print off any relevant for their situation. Upon commencing the application students are encouraged to book and appointment with Mrs Abbo to review the application and to receive points and tips. While some scholarships have commenced for 2019 entry, many will not open until students commence their course of study. Students and parents are advised to keep monitoring scholarship pages throughout the duration of tertiary study.



### **Recent Careers Events**

Careers Expo 2018: 192 Students attended this year's Newcastle and Lake Macquarie Careers Expo held at the Newcastle Jockey Club. Students were able to mingle with course providers, employers, gap year programs and accommodation services. Year 10 students have reported that attending this event was very beneficial.

Medical Science Day Garvin Institute Sydney: 35 students attended this day and the feedback was overwhelmingly positive. This is one of the most informative days for students unsure about what pathways they can follow in science. The guest speakers each outline their careers and delve into their current work. This year speakers ranged from doctors, forensic scientists, medical researchers, and medical engineers. Last year we also heard from a sport scientist. This is a yearly event so I would encourage students that did not attend this year to ensure that they make the effort next year to attend.

IT – Big Day In: On Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> June 10 students attended the UON to listen to a wide range of speakers outline their specific role within the world of IT. The range of occupations this year was inspiring and demonstrated to students how important IT will be in careers of the future. Many opportunities for work experience and cadetships are offered on this day so this is a must for anyone keen on finding out more about IT careers. This is also a yearly event so will be offered to students in 2019.

University visits to Merewether High School: Macquarie University, UNSW, University of Newcastle Psychology have all attended Merewether High School providing information about courses, scholarships and entry requirements in the last few weeks. Many students attended these events and found the sessions valuable in helping plan for the future.

Ex Students Return to give advice: In addition to the universities we have had several ex MHS students also return to provide current students with advice for undertaking tertiary pathways reflecting on their experiences and outlining their highlights and insights.

Ellie Smith a recent graduate from the joint medical program at Newcastle /UNE provided wisdom regarding a range of medical entry processes and outlined her personal experiences in a regional university and the benefits that have stemmed from this originally unplanned pathway. Ellie had real life experiences of the practical component of being a medical student that students may not have previously been aware of and her advice was wise and considered.

Julia Barton recently returned to complete her Physiotherapy degree at the University of Newcastle after spending 2 years studying and the University of Hawaii as an elite athlete – playing Water Polo. Julia's unique experiences, study health in two countries, gave a clearer insight to students considering OS pathways. Having competed the SAT's, Julia provided sound advice on some approaches she would recommend.

### **Economics Update**


### Merewether High Collaborative Learning Space

With the recent establishment of the Creative Arts Hub in the area behind the library, the area previously used as our Drama Room will be reshaped into a Collaborative Learning Space.

Centrally located on the bottom floor of L Block, the Collaborative Learning Space will be shared across all Key Learning Areas. It will be able to accommodate up to two classes concurrently, and can be flexibly booked by class groups on a period-by-period basis.

In line with our focus on explicitly teaching critical thinking skills, analysis and evaluation, the space will be designed to facilitate improved group work skills, as well as self-directed learning.

With a strong focus on feedback and feedforward for student learning, we believe this space will be ideal for not only collaboration but cohort, small group and individual feedback.



### Realising the space

The phased conversion of the Drama Room into a Collaborative Learning Centre will require structural refurbishment and renewal and the addition of flexible furniture and fixtures. The fit-out has been specifically designed to facilitate group work, collaboration and enhanced learning.

The conversion of the space will require:

- electrical structural work to support technology integration,
- painting,
- attachment of storyboarding and brainstorm stations and display boards
- installation of a range of flexible furniture options, similar to those show above, to provide break-out zones, small group spaces and boardroom structures.
