Principal's Report

International Women's Day (IWD) was celebrated around the world on March 8th and was a day to reflect on how far we have come and how far we still have to go to achieve gender equality. Three of our students Zoe, Teza and Evina, Mrs Inglis and I represented Merewether High School at the IWD Breakfast held at Newcastle Wests. Founder of entrepreneurial movement, Inspiring Rare Birds, Jo Burston, presented the keynote address. Jo shared some of her personal story on the day, inspiring us to change the way we work, encouraging diversity, equality, innovation and an entrepreneurial culture in the workplace.

The global theme for IWD 2019 is 'Think equal, build smart, innovate for change', linking with the UN Commission on the Status of Women's focus on social protection, public services and sustainable infrastructure. 'More Powerful Together', the theme for the day which is a clarion call to stand in unison for gender equality.





This year we continue our leadership program to support students from Years 7 to 12. All students have been issued with a passport.

There are five Leadership Challenges which students must engage in:

Challenge 1 – School Carnivals - to attend and participate in the swimming, athletics and cross-country carnivals.

Challenge 2 – Academic Achievement - to attain 20 merit certificates

Challenge 3 – School Representation and Service, which may include activities such as debating, choir, band, SRC, sports, competitions etc. Two areas of service need to be completed for the Junior Challenge, three for the Senior Challenge.

Challenge 4 – Community Service, where students volunteer their time for the benefit of others. This may include Clean Up Australia Day, Red Shield Appeal, blood donations, coaching teams, Landcare etc. One area of service is to be completed for the Junior Challenge and two for the Senior Challenge.

Challenge 5 – Attitude and Commitment, where the Deputy Principal signs off on the student's outstanding work ethic, uniform, attendance and behaviour.

This is just one of the many programs we have in place to support our students. A full outline of our leadership and commendation schemes can be found on the school website.

Year 7 and 9 will sit their NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, grammar and punctuation, spelling and numeracy on 14th, 15th and 16th May. Individual student results will be available early September and will be sent home to parents with our students. NAPLAN is a snapshot at a point in time test, which gives us data to tell us what our students are doing well and areas for development. We ensure all students are familiar with the format and process of the tests but continue our normal teaching and learning programs with the skills to be tested in NAPLAN embedded into our everyday teaching and learning programs. We have many points in time that give us vital data to see where our students are at and NAPLAN is just one of these.

The 19th February saw close to two hundred and fifty people come together at the annual Year 7 parent and student welcome BBQ. The opportunity to meet other parents, along with some of the staff, was greatly appreciated by our new parents. After the BBQ many students stayed to enjoy our first school dance for the year. The SRC are to be congratulated for their support of this activity and their continual support of providing outstanding events helping us to celebrate at Merewether High. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the SRC for their work throughout the past twelve months and to those Year 12 students who have been on the SRC for the past six years, thank you for your continued service to the school.

The athletics carnival, held on Thursday 7th, was another great event on our school calendar. The carnival was an outstanding day with many students challenging themselves and participating in events throughout the day. School spirit and sense of community were very evident to all in attendance. Along with the swimming carnival, the athletics carnival was another demonstration of how our students are willing to have a go and build school spirit.

Each year we complete an Annual School Report for the previous year. The report outlines our achievements across the school, academically, culturally, in sport and leadership, along with data analysis of our HSC and NAPLAN results. The report will be available on the website at the end of the term.

Year 12 will commence their midyear assessment period on Tuesday 2nd March. Assessments will continue through until the last day of term, Friday 12th April. Year 12 participated in a Study Skills session on Ace your Exams on Monday 4th March and have been encouraged to work with a mentor teacher. Any student who has not already done so, can still approach a teacher and ask them to mentor them as we move through to the HSC.



The **P&C** AGM will be held Tuesday 19th March in the Independent Learning Centre commencing at 7:00pm. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the outgoing executive members who have worked with and supported the school over the past twelve months.

The difficulty in picking up and dropping students around the school is recognised, but I ask that parents do not use the staff car park for this purpose. The car park is inadequate for staff parking and is not designed to have cars travelling in both directions. For safety, the car park during the morning and the afternoon is not to be used for drop off or pick up. I appreciate your ongoing support in ensuring the safety of all students.

Congratulations to Sharvil Kesarwani, who has been invited by the Australian Mathematical Olympiad Committee (AMOC), to represent Merewether High School at this year's AMOC Selection School. The school will be held at Naamaroo Uniting Venues in Sydney in March 2019. Twenty-six students from across Australia will be attending the school. The invitation is a particular honour as the principle purpose of this Selection School will be to select the six members of the Australian Team to compete at the International Mathematical Olympiad (IMO) to be held later this year. An outstanding honour, on which we congratulate him.

Last year 56,997 students sat VALID 8. We are delighted that Daisy Grady, Abby Jones and Benjamin Lathwell all achieved the fifth highest score in the state along with twenty-eight other students, placing them in the top fifty students in the state.

Congratulations to Rohan St Hill who recently competed in the Newcastle Triathlon and came first in his age group and thirtieth out of two hundred and six competitors overall.

Congratulations to Hannah Harrison on being selected to travel to Europe in September as part of the 2019 Premier's Anzac Memorial Scholarship. Also congratulations to Saskia Ferguson and Jess Fonti who were runners up in this competition.

Congratulations Ryan Woolnough who has been named in the NSW under 15s hockey team to contest the Australian Championships in April.

Deputy's Report

It is with great pride that I acknowledge all staff and students are strongly absorbed in the teaching and learning process at Merewether High and our year is in full swing. We continue to place strong emphasis on organisation and planning with all groups and we actively encourage students to use their school diary on a daily basis for planning, reflection and organisation. These are great examples of the rich experience of Merewether High School life and I encourage all students to take part and support these events. Pi day will feature a "bake off" a "Pi recital" and a range of games and competitions.

Harmony Day will celebrate the diversity of our school community with focus on the varied culture and native languages of our students. The major Year 12 Fundraiser of the year will see a team of more than 60 students support the Leukaemia Foundation with our annual 'Be Brave and Shave Assembly'. Social Science

Term 1 is well underway with all students engaged in a busy program of school based activities and a variety of opportunities for extension and extra-curricular activities. Our HSC students have just completed their second assessment task and will now focus their efforts on preparing for the upcoming Mid - Course Assessment Period in weeks 10 and 11. Year 11 students, including the new accelerated Year 10 cohort in Legal Studies and Business Studies are completing the foundation work for the preliminary course in preparation for their first assessment task later this term. Our senior students are encouraged to complete practice questions and submit these to their class teacher to gain essential feedback to ensure they are able to refine their exam technique and seek clarification of concepts related area of study.

Opportunities for Gifted & Talented Students

The Social Science faculty has a strong record of providing enrichment and extension opportunities. The following activities are available for students to be involved in:

• **MHS Environment Group**: In 2019 the group is being run by two of our senior leaders Arthy Mukunthan and Bianka Arunraj with the assistance of Mrs Green. They plan to focus on sustainability and clothing and will work with Year 9 Geography students on activities associated with their War on Waste course work.

Current competitions:

- The National Geographic Channel (*Australian Geography Competition 2019*) will be held during Weeks 9 -11 of Term 1.
- The ASX Share Market Game is underway. Students in Year 9 Commerce will test their financial skills in this competition. The students are in the process of spending up to \$50 000 on shares in Australia's leading public companies. This is part of the study of Personal Finance and Investment. The game runs for 10 weeks and although very difficult to win, it provides students with an excellent insight into the issues associated with investing.
- The *Mock Trial Competition* is underway for 2019 under the guidance of Mrs. Tonks. Mr Evers continues to mentor the team.
- The *Model United Nations Assembly* (MUNA) Competition will take place on June 1st 2019. Mrs. Burnett will be selecting students for this competition in week 8.
- The **UNSW Business School Australian Economics and Business Studies Competition** will be held in May. All Economics and Business Studies students are involved in this competition.

 Aboriginal Perspectives incursion All Year 7 Geographers will be engaged in a two period activity on Monday the 1st April with Cultural Education Officer David Newham to learn more about Aboriginal perspectives on landforms and traditional management practices.








LUNA PARK EXCURSION FOR YEAR 8 VISUAL ARTS MANDATORY

NAPLAN on paper – information for parents and carers

NAPLAN NATIONAL ASSESSMENT PROGRAM Literacy and Numeracy

Why do students do NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life.

Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

The assessment provides parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process - it does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are meeting important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

What is assessed?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum. All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN materials.

How can I help my child prepare?

Help your child prepare by reassuring them that NAPLAN is just one part of their school program, and by reminding them on the day to simply try their best. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers. NAPLAN is about assessing learning progress in literacy and numeracy.

Participation in NAPLAN

All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 are expected to participate in the annual NAPLAN assessment.

Students with disability may qualify for adjustments that reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments. You should first discuss the use of any disability adjustments for your child with your child's teacher.

A formal exemption may be granted for a student with disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or for a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on special provisions or the process required to gain a formal exemption.

Will my child sit NAPLAN on paper or online?

In 2019, your child will sit NAPLAN paper tests.

However, children in other schools across Australia will sit the NAPLAN online tests this year. Federal, state and territory education ministers have agreed that all schools will move online by 2020. State and territory education authorities will determine when their schools move online.

As students are assessed on the same literacy and numeracy curriculum content, regardless of whether they complete the test online or on paper, results for both formats can be reported on the same NAPLAN assessment scale. To find out more about NAPLAN Online, visit **nap.edu.au**



What if my child is absent from school on assessment days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the testing week. Individual students are not permitted to sit tests after Friday 17 May 2019.

How is my child's performance measured?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each test. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student has demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be issued by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to better identify students who would benefit from greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas to improve in teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see average school NAPLAN results at myschool.edu.au

Grief is a natural response to loss. It might be the loss of a loved one, relationship or even a pet. The more significant the loss, the more intense the grief is likely to be. Children and adults grieve differently due to their developmental stage, and this can prove difficult for parents to understand.

Young children fluctuate in and out of the stages of grief rapidly, as they may not comprehend the permanency death. They express their grief more physically. Teens on the other hand may not know how to express their grief and will need some space to process their loss. Some may choose to grieve alone, not wanting to stand out or be seen as not coping. Whilst others, who may have a greater understanding, can start to question their own mortality.

In this edition of SchoolTV, parents can learn how to acknowledge their child's feelings and the best way to support them through the grief. We hope you take time to reflect on the information offered in this month's edition and we always welcome your feedback.
